Meeting national curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.	As a school we engaged with the RNLI to provide water safety and self-rescue training in the Spring 2022 (7.4.22), to supplement what we were offering in swimming.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	In the 2021/2022 cohort, 94% were able to confidently swim 25m+ by the time they left our school.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke and breaststroke]?	In the 2021/2022 cohort, 84% of pupils were using a range of strokes effectively
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	In the 2021/2022 cohort, 96 % were able to perform safe self-rescue
